




Historical Background



The "Hellships"

- Throughout the war, POWs were shipped from other areas back to Japan for use as laborers
- The term is based on the horrible conditions on board, poor treatment, poor health of the POWs
- Ships used were not always marked as POW transports; attacked by US aircraft and submarines

"Hellships" from the Philippines

- In the Philippines, over 20,000 Allied POWs were held
 - Primarily at Cabanatuan, Davao, and Bilibid Prison POW camps
- Prior to December 1944, two major sinkings in Philippines resulted in over 2,400 deaths at sea
- December 1944: in Manila, 1,621* POWs board *Oryoku Maru*







Transfer on Land





December 20, 1944: survivors taken to San Fernando, Pampanga

• Held in provincial jail; 15 wounded prisoners are executed

December 27: Transfer to San Fernando, La Union

• Board *Enoura Maru* and *Brazil Maru*, resume voyage







Route to Takao, Formosa (Taiwan)



December 27, 1944 – January 1, 1945: Journey to Takao

- Deaths during journey; burials at sea
- Deaths that occurred prior to arrival are turned over
- On arrival, all placed aboard *Enoura Maru*


January 9: US aircraft attack Enoura Maru

• Explosion kills ~300 POWs

January 12: Japanese allow transfer of dead ashore

• Reports of cremations, then mass burials on shore







Aboard Brazil Maru to Japan




January 14, 1945: Survivors continue on Brazil Maru

- Deaths from illness, wounds from January 9 attack
- Burials at sea until 3 days from Japan

January 29: Arrival at Moji, Japan

- About 500 of original 1,619 came ashore
- Some deaths just after arrival
- Approximately 300+ survive the war

Challenges: Postwar Recoveries



Oryoku Maru

- August 1946: Navy salvage team conducts exploratory dive in Subic Bay
- Remains disintegrated on contact
- Wreck deemed too unstable and dangerous for further exploration
- Ship partially demolished for safety reasons

Enoura Maru


- Recoveries in Takao, May-June 1946
- Those who died more than 3 days from Takao were buried ashore at Fukuteikin Cemetery

Brazil Maru

- Those who died more than 3 days from Moji were buried at sea
- Remains brought ashore were reported cremated

The Project



Receive Approval to Disinter the Enoura Maru unknowns

- 2018: DPAA disinterred X-546A, purportedly one individual
 - At least 4 DNA sequences were found, Capt Schade identified (skull)
 - 407 1 = 406
- Test against the selected missing from the three ships, due to discrepancies
- Test against resolved individuals because of commingling
- DPAA is collecting DNA reference samples for ~1,000 associated casualties
- 60% reference samples required before DPAA can propose disinterment



Additional Ways Ahead



San Fernando Cemetery

- Waypoint for POWs after *Oryoku Maru*; 15 believed executed
- DPAA is routing a disinterment memo for 12 related unknowns

Japan Unknowns

Determine whether unknowns recovered from Japan may be associated

Present-Day Remains

- Investigate any remains reported in Subic Bay, Takao, Japan
- So far, DPAA has investigated reports from Subic Bay, with negative results
