




- 1951-56 over 25,000 recoveries
- 867 unknowns: 451 from South Korea (another 416 from the North)
- 400 exhumations since 1999,
 150 have been accounted for.



Air War Over Korea







Veterans Oral History Program



- Active program to collect perishable info
- 193 military reunions since 1996
- Over 2,600 veterans screened
 - All divisions, multi-service events, ex-POW associations
 - Over 1/3 of living POW returnees
- Five to seven reunions annually, plus telephonic, veteran residence visits
- Clarify loss incidents, locate grave sites






Research Efforts


Battle of Unsan



Joint Field Activities

1996, 1997, 2000 – 2005

18 missions, 61 IDs

- 38 from joint field activities
- 23 from DPRK unilateral returns



POW Transfer Research



This intensive and lengthy effort included:

- Hundreds of interviews
- Archival research in former Gulag "capitals"
- Contracted research by local "memorial societies"
- Examination of records of psychiatric hospitals
- Examination of records of Russian prisons which held foreigners
- Examination of documents from 15 major archival systems

South Korean Successes



Ensign Robert W. Langwell, USN

- Lost at sea, October 1, 1950
- South Korean fisherman located and buried in 1950
- June 2009 located
- November 2009 identified



Private First Class James J. Leonard, Jr.

- •Killed in Action, 25 August 1950
- Located March 2017 in Yongdong, Chungcheong Province
- Remains found by South Korean Telecom company, recovered by MAKRI
- August 2017 identified





North Korea Operations



- 5,300 lost in North Korea
- Operations conducted from 1996-2005
- 229 sets of remains recovered
- Forensic analysis to establish identifications on remains recovered from past operations continues
- Operations suspended in May 2005 due to heightened tensions on the peninsula
- Arrangement to resume operations in 2012 cancelled















- 208 boxes turned over by North Korea
- More than 400 individuals contained within
- 187 accounted-for to date





55 Containers of Remains from DPRK



- 27 July 2018 turnover at Wonsan to US Forces Korea
- 1 August 2018 assessed into DPAA in Honolulu
- 55 Containers of remains and military artifacts
- One Dog Tag from U.S. Army 8th Cavalry Regiment MIA at Unsan, November 1950
- Location of discovery included with the remains
- 70 accounted for
 — from Chosin,
 Unsan and Kujang

Korean War Unknowns How many were interred?



- 867* Unknowns in the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific (NMCP)
 - 432 ROK (South Korea)
 - 416 DPRK (North Korea)
 - 19 additional remains recovered in the 1950s and 1960s



Korean War Disinterment Numbers 1999-Present







400 Korean War Unknowns disinterred to date (46%)



Phased Korean War Disinterment Plan










The Korean War Identification Project (KWIP)



KWIP Analyzes Korea Cases in the Lab (since March 2019)



- Total 588 IDs
- 434 IDs (74%) were made since the KWIP launch in FY2011
 41 in FY 20
