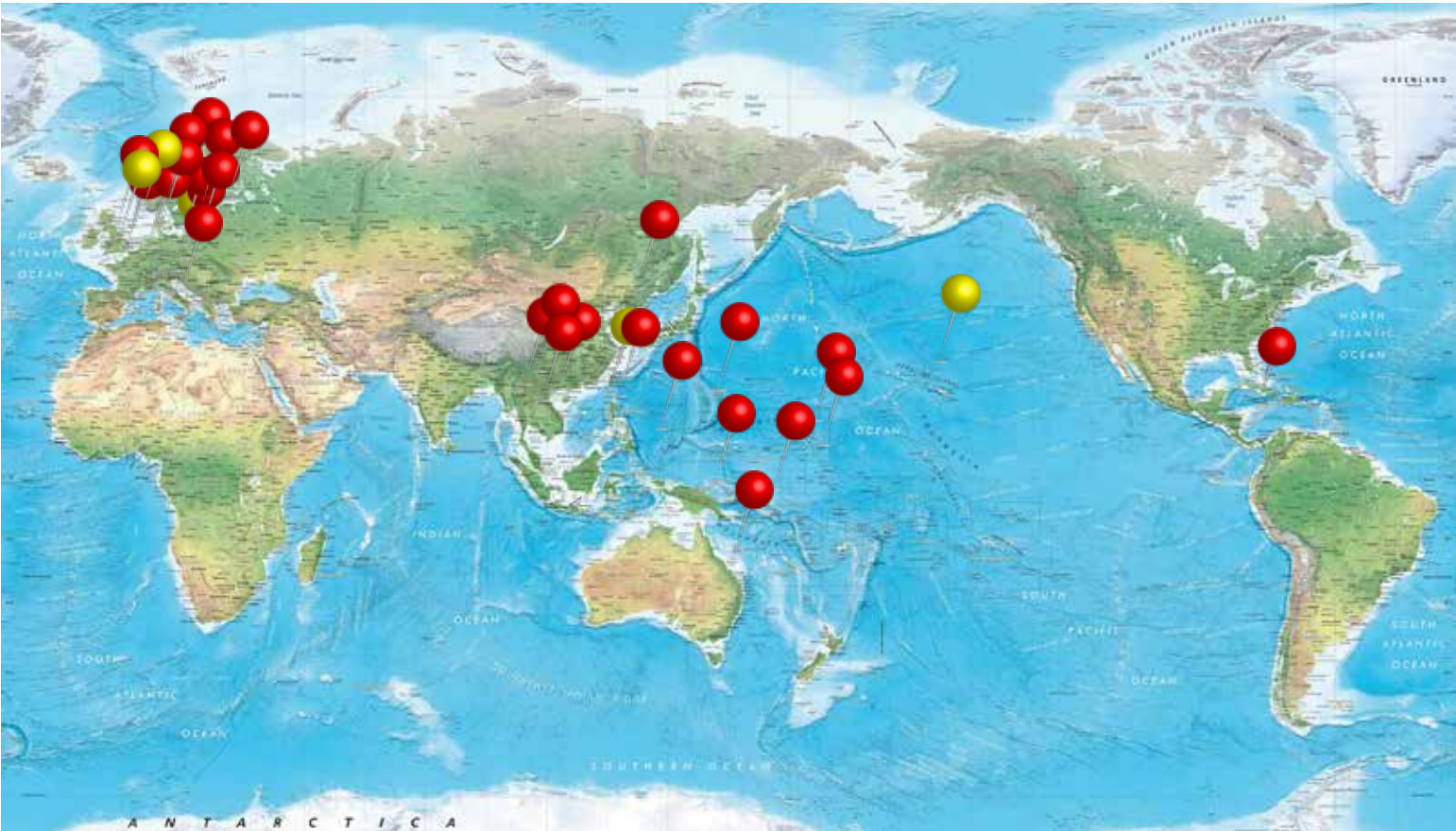

A Year For Milestones



The red pins in the map indicate locations where DPAA conducted investigation or recovery missions. The yellow pins represent disinterments locations.

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) came into Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 with full plans to get back out in the field as much as COVID-19 would allow and surpassed several milestones in the process.

Our organic and partner investigation and recovery missions took place in 31 countries, and we accessioned 364 sets of osseous material into our labs. We accounted for 142 Department of Defense personnel. All of this was accomplished while following all appropriate COVID safety protocols. These numbers were increases over FY 2020, but they were not the milestones.

In November, we held our first-ever, all-virtual Family Member Update (FMU), which was streamed live on our website and Facebook page. This was so successful we held three more virtual FMUs and also livestreamed our Korean/Cold War Annual Government Briefings (K/CW) and our annual Vietnam War Government Briefings. The latter was held in conjunction with the 51st Annual Meeting of the National League of POW/MIA Families.

A milestone for the National League of POW/MIA Families was the 50th anniversary of their iconic black and white silhouette featured on the POW/MIA Flag, recognized around the world for the sacred mission of finding Americans missing from past conflicts. The 2021 POW/MIA

Recognition Day Poster and on the cover and throughout the pages of this magazine are POW/MIA flag photos with historical facts about the flag.

FY 2021 was a big year for our USS Oklahoma Project, hitting two milestones. First, at the end of January, Marine Pfc. John F. Middleswart was the 300th identification from the ship. Then, at the beginning of August, Seaman 1st Class Buford H. Dyer was the 350th identification. Another significant milestone came in February when Lt. Cmdr. Hugh R. Alexander, a dental officer aboard the USS Oklahoma, became the 1,000th identification made since DPAA was formed in 2015.

In March, we accounted for U.S. Army Chaplain (Capt.) Emil J. Kapaun. For his many selfless acts during the Korean War, Chaplain Kapaun was named a Servant of God by the Catholic Church in 1993, the first step on the path to sainthood. He was also posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor in 2013.

We ended FY 2021 with a final milestone when we conducted the first-ever Joint Repatriation Ceremony with the Republic of Korea in Hawaii. South Korean President Moon Jae-in spoke at the ceremony held at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam. Six sets of remains were given to the U.S. and 68 sets of remains were repatriated to South Korea.

Fiscal Year 2021 started off strong despite COVID-19 still having a massive effect on agency travel and activities. We launched our first organic mission, an underwater investigation/recovery mission to the Solomon Islands, since recalling our deployed teams in March 2020. We followed all required safety protocols to ensure the health of our personnel. We also leveraged our partnerships, fielding an underwater recovery mission in the Kingdom of Sweden and an underwater investigation mission in the Federal Republic of Germany. The 141st Joint Field Activities (JFA) in the Socialist Republic of Vietnam, comprised of three host nation recovery teams (RT), began operations. We disinterred 11 Unknowns from the Sicily-Rome American Cemetery and Memorial in the Italian Republic; and 12 from the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific (NMCP) in Honolulu. We also identified four previously unaccounted-for service members.

In November, DPAA undertook our first organic field activity since COVID-19 travel restrictions began with a recovery mission to the Solomon Islands. While the team was quarantined in Guam, all travel to the Solomon Islands was restricted by the government because of the virus. However, the team pivoted to conduct recovery operations around Guam instead. The 141st JFA continued in the Socialist Republic of Vietnam. We also held our first-ever virtual Family Member Update (FMU) for families in and around Little Rock, Arkansas. Additionally, our laboratory at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, received 11 disinterments from the Sicily-Rome American Cemetery and Memorial in Italy, and we accounted for 11 formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

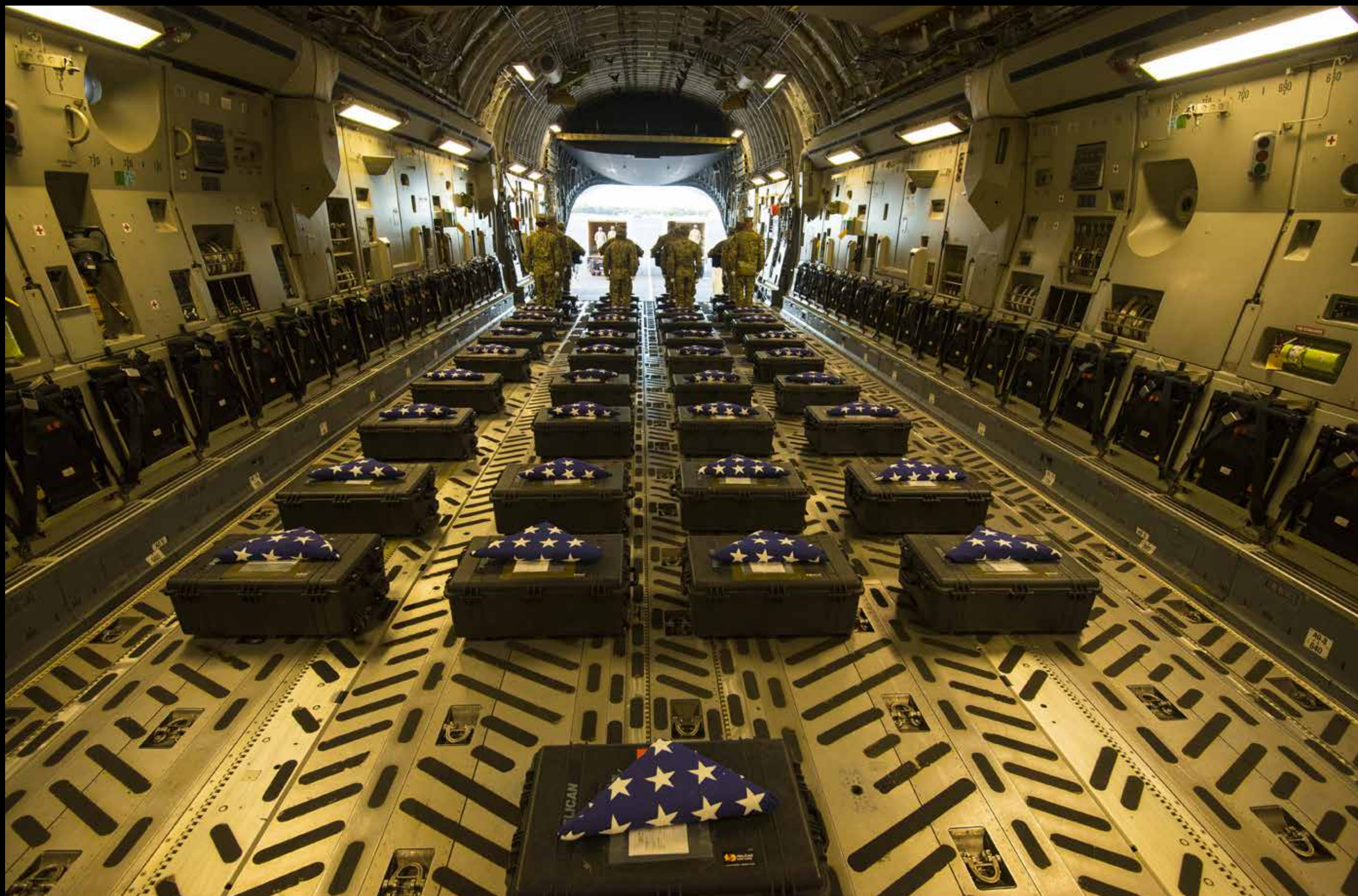


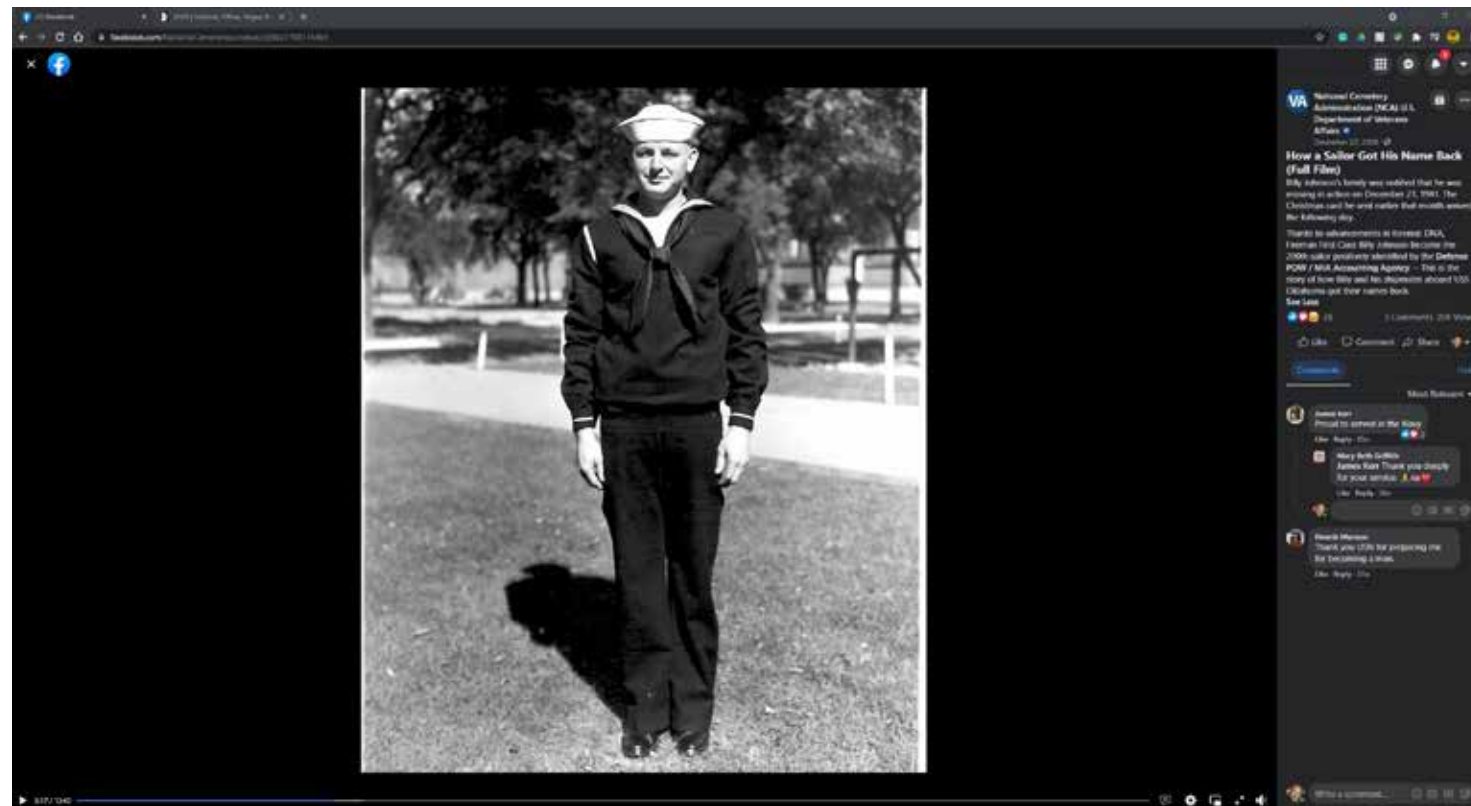

The 141st JFA in the Socialist Republic of Vietnam came to an end this month as did the organic mission in Guam. Our Nebraska laboratory received biological and material evidence from a partner underwater RT who operated off the coast of the Republic of Croatia, and our Hawaii laboratory received 41 sets of remains disinterred from the MACM in the Republic of the Philippines. Since COVID-19 prevented us from having in-person holiday gatherings, we hosted our first-ever online Morale Day to bring our geographically dispersed team together virtually. We also accounted for 18 formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

Europe-Mediterranean

The Europe-Mediterranean (EM) Regional Directorate accomplished a number of field operations and disinterments in FY 2021, learning lessons from operating during the continuing pandemic, and putting processes into place which allowed us to investigate, recover, and disinter remains potentially associated to missing DoD personnel while also minimizing risk to the teams. DPAA conducted two research trips and eight terrestrial investigations in Belgium, Germany, Great Britain, Hungary, Italy, Luxembourg, Panama, Poland, and the United States, each of which yielded new information for several cases and will result in recoveries of missing personnel in future years.

Our team supporting the U.S. Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIAs secured access to the Russian Archives and continued employment of Russian researchers despite the tense bi-lateral relationship between the U.S. and Russia. Two DPAA scientists coordinated with a partner to recover remains at the former site of POW Camp Stalag Luft 6

in Lithuania. DPAA RTs excavated three sites associated with World War II aircraft losses in Austria, Belgium, and Germany. The successful recovery mission in Austria was years in the making as efforts by family members, DPAA senior leaders, U.S. Embassy-Vienna, U.S. Members of Congress, and Austrian government officials convinced a reluctant landowner to allow access to the alpine site. That reluctant landowner is now an enthusiastic champion of the DPAA mission.

EM accomplished 88 disinterments of unknown remains at eight American Battle Monuments Commission (ABMC) cemeteries, exceeding our FY 2021 goal of 85. The remains recovered potentially represent missing Airmen, Soldiers, Sailors, and Marines from ground campaigns, aircraft losses, and ship losses across the European Theater.

Indo-Pacific

The Indo-Pacific (IP) Regional Directorate displayed a remarkable ability to adapt, innovate, and improvise in FY 2021, evidenced by completion of seven JFAs, consisting of 15 organic RTs, six Investigation Teams (IT), and 18 disinterment missions.

Recovery efforts in Southeast Asia remained the operational priority for the agency and have been buoyed by the efforts of our forward-staged operating detachments in Laos, Thailand, and Vietnam and by our strong relationships with the Lao POW/MIA Team, Kingdom of Cambodia POW/MIA Committee, and Vietnam Office for Seeking Missing Persons (VNOSMP).

Partnership with the Navy’s Experimental Dive Unit facilitated underwater IT work around the coast of Guam, and moderate COVID effects permitted IT activities in Thailand and planning for India. Data-sharing with our Republic of Korea (RoK) counterpart, the Ministry of National Defense’s Killed in Action Recovery and Identification (MAKRI), facilitated unilateral research and joint missions throughout the Demilitarized Zone, Central Corridor, and Busan perimeter. Annual World War II and Korean War Case Coordination Conferences, and a research exchange with the Chinese People’s Liberation Army Archives resulted in advancement of multiple

cases. IP analysts from Virginia, Hawaii, Detachment 2 (Hanoi), and DPAA’s Ohio lab met in Crystal City, Virginia, July 26-30 to conduct the 62nd SEA Case Coordination Conference. They were joined by partners from the Defense Intelligence Agency’s Stony Beach program and coordinated the next steps on 379 SEA cases involving 622 missing personnel.

Supporting the agency’s outreach and communication efforts, IP researchers authored 597 family member Case Summaries and carried out 198 family Case Summary Review meetings. IP staff were the first researchers permitted back into the National Archives following COVID closures. IP completed 18 disinterment missions between the NMCP and the MACM, repatriating 114 and 102 sets of remains, respectively, exceeding the goal of 215 disinterred Unknowns.

IP found reason to celebrate despite the constraints of operating during the pandemic. These successes would not be possible without the tremendous work of the staff in our Accounting Support Branch, Research Support Division, Operations Support Branch, Sub-Regional Teams, and Detachments.

The new year began with DPAA launching an organic recovery mission to the Kingdom of Cambodia, where our team successfully met all health protection guidelines before moving to the site. The USS Oklahoma Project reached a significant milestone when we accounted for Marine Pfc. John F. Middleswart, the 300th identification from the ship since 2003. We also conducted the first-ever Virtual Archival Exchange with China's People's Liberation Army Archives Department, discussing cases from the Vietnam War, Cold War, Korean War, and World War II. Additionally, we disinterred eight Unknowns from the NMCP as part of the Korean War Disinterment Project, and we accounted for nine formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

300th USS OKLAHOMA IDENTIFICATION

DNA Laboratory Recap

Armed Forces Medical Examiner System

The Armed Forces Medical Examiner System-Armed Forces DNA Identification Laboratory (AFMES-AFDIL) continued to provide critical support to the DPAA’s identification efforts of missing service members in FY 2021. To maintain DNA testing requirements, AFMES-AFDIL continued running an AM and PM shift that allowed 100% of our staff to be in the laboratory daily, and in June, AFMES went to 100% staffing on a single shift. The pandemic led to critical shortages in common laboratory supplies that both AFDIL and COVID Testing Laboratories used, but due to strategic planning and ordering, these shortages only reduced DNA testing efforts in April and May. Despite this decrease, staff were able to continue to process high priority cases, write DNA Reports, and finish critical trainings to increase the number of staff trained in Next Generation Sequencing (NGS) methods.

The Family Reference Section finished the development

of an automated whole genome mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) NGS method for maternal references that allows for 90 samples to be processed at a time. The Emerging Technology Section continued working in conjunction with Parabon NanoLabs, Inc., as part of a DoD-funded research project, to complete the development of a nuclear DNA Single Nucleotide Polymorphism (SNP) assay and analytical software that will work with both chemically treated and non-chemically treated samples. This assay is similar to what Ancestry.com and 23andMe use, but tailored specifically for the challenging bone samples that DPAA submits for testing. AFMES-AFDIL’s Past Accounting Section increased NGS processing by 30%; reported over 3,000 DNA results (mtDNA, Y-STR, and auSTR DNA); and generated over 1,000 DNA Reports.

February brought a major milestone when we made the 1,000th identification of previously unaccounted-for DoD personnel since DPAA was established in 2015. Recovery operations in the Kingdom of Cambodia continued. Our organic IT and RTs taking part in the 142nd JFA arrived, our first entry into the Socialist Republic of Vietnam since COVID-19 began. We sent a team to the Republic of the Philippines to disinter 23 Unknowns from World War II buried at the MACM, where 22 others will be disinterred. We held our second virtual FMU, this time for families in and around Los Angeles and Honolulu. We also accounted for 26 formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

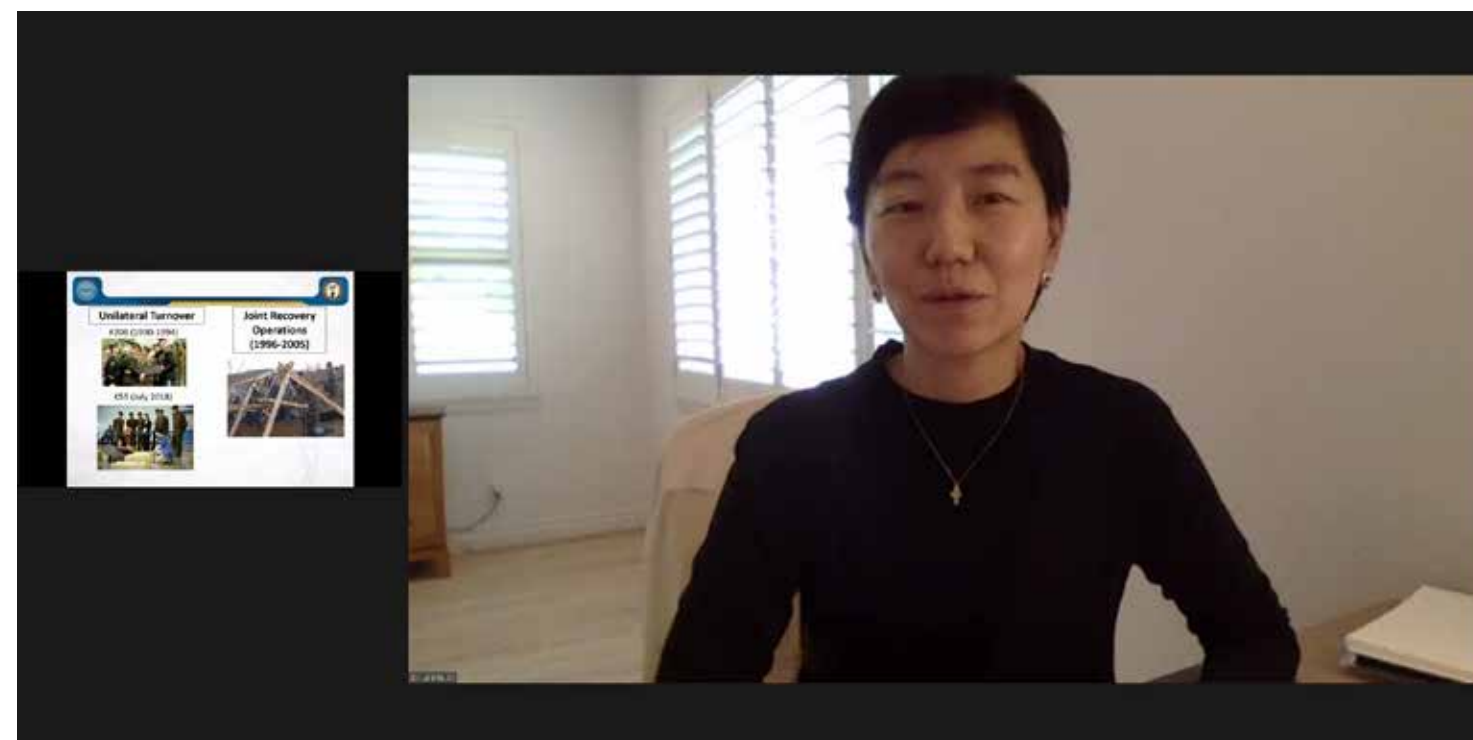

More than 50 DPAA specialists arrived in Danang, Vietnam, on Feb. 21. This was the first time DPAA personnel deployed to Vietnam since March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This JFA was planned in close coordination with the Government of Vietnam as a part of three decades of sustained bilateral cooperation. The team operated in Ha Tinh, Quang Binh, Quang Tri, Thua-Thien Hue, and Quang Nam Provinces.

The two gave a history of activities with North Korea, highlighting unilateral turnovers such as the K55 in 2018 and the challenges of resuming joint field missions in North Korea.



Partnerships & Innovations

The Partnerships and Innovations (PI) Directorate managed existing partners or conducted discussions with a total of 178 institutions in FY 2021. These efforts led to the finalization of 13 new partnership arrangements with external entities. PI also expanded the geographic basis of its pool of partners by focusing on organizations based abroad, with the aim of facilitating local access and reducing mission costs.

In FY 2021, DPAA planned to conduct 55 partner missions; however, because of safety concerns and host nation travel restrictions brought on by COVID-19, only 26 of those missions were executed. It was encouraging that partner teams nevertheless were in the field every quarter of the FY with a notable surge in the fourth quarter. Additionally, PI was able to reschedule the FY 2021 postponed missions and anticipates a large surge effort in FY 2022.

Some highlights from the field include the University of Illinois at Chicago’s field mission in Cambodia; multiple missions in Europe with American Veteran’s Archaeological Recovery; and projects with first-time partners Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Middle Tennessee State University, University of Wyoming, Geoscope, Western Australia Museum, Colorado State University, and RPM Nautical Foundation. PI also amplified and expanded the “Hub & Spoke” History Program that incorporates the research and networking potential of individuals embedded in 14 academic and research institutions across the U.S. These and other partners are currently working on nearly 50 research requests from directorates across DPAA.

Finally, DPAA launched innovation initiatives in FY 2021 aimed at finding creative new ways to identify technology, equipment, and procedures that offer the potential to expand DPAA’s capacity and capabilities. These include endeavors related to future underwater investigations and recovery efforts and wetlands

DPAA Laboratory

The DPAA Laboratory continued to identify missing DoD personnel during FY 2021 by leveraging a balance between telework posture and in-laboratory work challenges. We accounted for 142 missing Americans in FY 2021 and identified 211 additional remains of previously accounted-for service members.

The USS Oklahoma Identification Project continued to reach many milestones. It commenced in the summer of 2015 with the disinterment of nearly 13,000 highly commingled bones. Remarkably, 361 Sailors and Marines have been individually identified, which is over 90% of all missing from this ship. In June, the USS Oklahoma group remains were transferred from the Nebraska laboratory to the Hawaii laboratory for turnover to the U.S. Navy and interment at the NMCP on the 80th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Accessions of remains from disinterments continued in FY 2021, including all 101 Unknowns from Phase 3 of the Korean War Disinterment Project, 102 accessions from the MACM, and 88 accessions from various cemeteries in Europe. In addition, exhumations commenced on the 47 Unknowns from the Battle of Myitkina, Burma, who are buried at the NMCP.

A new addition to the lab’s thirteen Special Projects is the Southeast Asia Project that reviews and analyzes all existing and new evidence from Vietnam War accessions. A dedicated project that will add more efficiency to the identification

process. Despite COVID’s continued impacts on field operations, there were localized improving trends which permitted laboratory forensic scientists to successfully complete site survey and recovery operations in 15 countries, including first-time scientific efforts in Guam and Lithuania. Continued efforts by the VNOSMP kept unilateral host-nation recovery operations going throughout the year. These and organic DPAA teams comprised a total of 85 sites scientifically processed throughout the world.

In December, the DPAA Laboratory’s scope of accreditation was officially extended to fully encompass Geographical Profile (via Isotope Ratio Mass Spectrometry). The laboratory was the originator of the Geographical Profile component/parameter for isotope testing under the Anthropology discipline and is thus unique within the U.S. In May, the DPAA Laboratory, in conjunction with the DPAA Academy, hosted the first Virtual Scientific Summit. Originally to be held in person, this event was a huge success with participation from nine countries.

The laboratory supported the first U.S.-Republic of Korea Joint Repatriation Ceremony in Hawaii by reviewing, selecting, and sampling over one hundred sets of possible Korean remains. The year-long preparation process involved extensive collaboration with the scientists at MAKRI, which led to the successful repatriation of 68 Korean soldiers, and return of 6 potential U.S. remains.

March was a busy month for DPAA, starting with the accounting of Chaplain (Capt.) Emil J. Kapaun, who was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor in 2013 and is being considered for sainthood by the Catholic Church for his actions during the Korean War. Our three RTs and one IT taking part in the 142nd JFA in the Socialist Republic of Vietnam began work after their two-week quarantine. Our organic RT continued operations in the Kingdom of Cambodia, and we launched partner missions to the Republic of Austria and the Kingdom of Belgium. Additionally, we disinterred 48 Unknowns -- 16 from the NMCP and 32 from the MACM. We also accounted for 20 formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

DPAA began the month by remembering the seven U.S. service members and nine Vietnamese personnel lost in a 2001 MI-17 helicopter crash in the Socialist Republic of Vietnam during a mission planning flight; ceremonies were held at the Pentagon, our Hawaii facility, and the crash site in Vietnam. Our investigation and recovery efforts continued in the Socialist Republic of Vietnam, the Republic of Austria, the Kingdom of Belgium, and the Kingdom of Cambodia. Field operations began in the Republic of Korea, Lao People's Democratic Republic, the Kingdom of Thailand, and the Republic of Panama. We disinterred 16 Korean War Unknowns from the NMCP as part of Phase 3 of the Korean War Disinterment Project. We also held a virtual FMU for families in and around Albuquerque, New Mexico, and accounted for five formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

The high operational tempo continued with investigation and recovery efforts, both organic and partnered, in the Republic of Austria, the Kingdom of Belgium, the Lao People's Democratic Republic, the French Republic, and the Socialist Republic of Vietnam. New field operations commenced in Hungary, the Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and the Federal Republic of Germany. We disinterred 31 World War II Unknowns from the ABMC's Ardennes, Lorraine, and Normandy American Cemeteries, and 16 Korean War Unknowns from the NMCP. We also accounted for 14 formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

We virtually connected with families during our Korean/Cold War Annual Government Briefings (K/CW). We also conducted organic and partner investigation and recovery missions to the Lao People's Democratic Republic, the Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Federal Republic of Germany, the Republic of Croatia, the Italian Republic, the French Republic, and the Republic of Austria. We commenced field work in the Republic of Palau, the Marshall Islands, the Republic of Poland, the Republic of Lithuania, and the Kingdom of Denmark. We also disinterred 12 World War II Unknowns from the Brittany, Normandy, Netherlands, and Henri-Chappelle American Cemeteries, and four Korean War Unknowns from the NMCP, finishing Phase 3 of the Korean War Disinterment Project. We accounted for eight formerly missing persons from past conflicts.

It was a busy end to FY 2021. The President of the Republic of Korea was the principal official at the Joint Repatriation Ceremony in Hawaii. We also held our Annual Vietnam War Government Briefings in conjunction with the 51st Annual Meeting of the National League of POW/MIA Families in Virginia; conducted a Chain of Custody ceremony for Chaplain Emil Kapaun; and held ceremonies for POW/MIA Recognition Day across the globe. Organic and partner investigation and recovery missions continued in the Lao People's Democratic Republic, the Republic of Poland, the Republic of Palau, the Federal Republic of Germany, the Marshall Islands, the Italian Republic, the Republic of Korea, the French Republic, the Republic of Austria, and the Republic of Croatia, with new missions beginning in the Commonwealth of Australia, the Kingdom of Belgium, and the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. We disinterred 21 World War II from multiple ABMC cemeteries in Europe and accounted for seven formerly missing persons from past conflicts.
